We eagerly began the term with many learners attending sport and cultural activities while adhering to the Covid protocols. Midway through May, just when we thought the virus was beaten, a new variant began to storm back. We saw how things began to change significantly when a handful of our learners began testing positive for COVID-19. This marked the beginning of the 3rd COVID-19 wave. We have seen during the rest of the term just how devastating this 3rd wave has been (possibly perpetuated by the 60% more transmissible Delta variant), particularly in Gauteng, with overwhelmed health services.

During this wave, almost all of our learners and teachers have been affected by COVID-19: either contracting the disease and having to isolate or then having to quarantine due to primary contact or then just knowing someone who has been directly affected by COVID-19. Our communication team, Mrs McBride and Mrs Goldin managed

the communication between families and the school and everyone stepped up to support each other during the mid year assessment cycle. Despite the challenges of this crisis, we end the term on lockdown level 4 in the hope that the wave will subside by the time we return to school for the 3rd term. The staff will be feeling relieved after receiving their extra layer of protection on the 29th of June through the DBE's vaccine programme.

I am most grateful to every family, staff member and learner who has juggled the demands of the Covid crisis, its pain and challenges, the housework, the caring of the children and the elderly and the job responsibilities. It has not been easy, but the Jeppe spirit has demonstrated just how to show up in times like these and have made every effort to rise above the crisis. As you continue your journey during the pandemic, I am hoping that you will renew your strength in your God and soar above the Covid-mountain like an eagle. The programme was viewed online by knit wits across the country, but a small Jeppe contingent which included Miss Gonçalves, Tshaamano Mabuba, Snamile Mthembu, Ayabukwa Magocoba and Buhlebenkosi Mungwe who were guest speakers at the event did Jeppe proud with their eloquence and passion.

Snamile Mthembu spoke at the event on how crocheting has impacted her life. She is a proud participant of the 67 minutes Nelson Mandela Blanket Drive initiative and inspired her classmates to make many bokke blankets last year. She loves the fact that Jeppe uses competition between the classes to encourage girls to make blankets for the blanket drive. Snamile crochets whenever she has a moment, even on the side of the field while supporting her cricket teammates! "The more blankets I complete gives me joy in knowing that I have helped a family stay warm during our harsh winter seasons. JEPPE LAUNCHES A RADIO STATION



Jeppe Girls made history this term by launching their first ever radio station. The station runs for 10 minutes during Registration from Monday to Thursday and is hosted by two Councillors with larger than life personalities — Ayabukwa Magocoba (left) and Buhlebenkosi Mungwe (right). Both hosts are passionate public speakers.



Why a radio station and why now? These questions were posed to Tshaamano Mabuba, Head Girl. She said that during the epidemic, without being able to communicate to the school via Assemblies, the Councillors felt that something was necessary to rejuvenate the Jeppe spirit and energy at the school. The team brainstormed various ideas with Miss Gonçalves and came up with the idea of a radio show. Jeppe Radio broadcasts over the school intercom system which reaches every classroom.

Each day has a theme – Mindfulness Monday, Take Charge Tuesday, Woza Wednesday and Takalani Thursday. The show includes interviewing guests who speak on topics of interest – Miss Gonçalves spoke on 'Taking charge of Covid' and the school wellness team spoke on coping with anxiety and feeding your soul. There have been competitions and the ever popular Jeppe Quiz where 10 questions need to be answered in 90 seconds and staff take on girls and different grades take on one another. Miss King spoke on 'being mindful' and gave the girls some meditation tips and there have been musical items from Hlabelela and music students.

Our presenters got to do their first 'outside broadcast' at the 67blankets Stronger Together event at Steyn City.

Well done to the radio team for making a difference and lifting the Jeppe spirit.

BLANKET DISTRIBUTION

This is the second year in a row that we have been unable to take girls with us when distributing blankets to those in need.

We had a number of blankets that came in after last year's distribution, and were able to give 60 blankets to Ethembeni Children's Home, 28 blankets to Avalon Home for the Physically Disabled and 26 blankets for the 10 women and 16 children currently living at Bienvenu shelter.

We received 200 springbok blankets from Steyn City, and Piet, Saulo and Mrs Heming drove round Bertrams with Rene Du Plooy of We Care distributing them. 34 blankets went to Park Cottages, 74 went to the Gerald Fitzpatrick Home for the Aged, 77 went to Max Goodman and 20 went to Umlazi Mental Home.

OPENING OF THE PERFORMING ARTS CENTRE

On 30th November 2018, at the final assembly of the year, Mrs Carolyn Steyn surprised the school with a birthday gift of R1,7 million. This gift was transformed into a Performing Arts Centre to honour her love of theatre, music and the stage, the very place she found her talent at our school back in 1977. On 15th October 2020 she donated a further R250 000 towards the sprung floor. The building of the centre was completed during the Covid -19 Pandemic, an eternal reminder to all who use this facility that "Nothing is too difficult for the brave."

The opening of the centre was a joyous celebration of music and dance. Hlabelela welcomed Mrs Steyn and her guests with beautiful a capella song and dance. Mrs Steyn then cut the ribbon to declare the centre officially open and unveiled the plaque commemorating the occasion. Timothy Moloi gave a very moving performance of "The Prayer" by C Bayer-Sager and D Foster before the guests moved inside.

Miss Gonçalves thanked Mrs Steyn for "giving our learners, present and future, the space to learn, explore and create." She also thanked the architect, Mr Marc Aitken for the role he played, Ian Clasen of Quoin Construction who headed up the building of the beautiful centre and Mr Jarvis from the Governing Body who assisted as project manager.

Mrs Steyn gave a very personal speech of why she chose to come to Jeppe Girls and her experience at the school. She was painfully shy at school but was sent for elocution lessons by her mother so that she could learn how to speak well. She did well in Speech and Drama Eistedfodds and decided to audition for the lead role of Joan of Arc in her matric year. To her surprise she was chosen for the role and awarded the "Best Actress" prize that year. She then completed an Honours degree in Speech and Drama at Wits University and went on to pursue her dreams. "Drama completely changed my life." Said Mrs Steyn. "I firmly believe that expressing ourselves through music, through dance and through drama is essential - to everyone. Acting, and speech and drama, gave me the confidence that I so badly needed. And that confidence is needed in life in general."

Mrs Steyn's mother was a wonderful opera singer who could not realise her dreams because of circumstance. She said her mother would have been proud to see the addition of the performing arts centre at the school. She encouraged the girls not to let anyone belittle their dreams and to use their love of the creative arts to realise their strengths.

Mrs Steyn invited 10 of her friends who were in her year at Jeppe Girls to share the opening of the centre with her, as well as her sisters Colleen Teklenburg (also a Jeppe Old Girl) and Sharon Barkhuizen who attended Queens High.

Dr Kruger, Head of Music at the school thanked Mrs Steyn for the huge difference that the centre will make to the lives of the girls and the staff. She also presented Mrs Steyn with a beautiful music cake. The Performing Arts Centre will be used for drama, dance, orchestra, choir practises and performances and music exams. It will also be used for the Philip Moore Music Competition which opens on 31 July this year.

The guests enjoyed a musical performance by the Uhlume and Izimpande choirs as well as a medley by the Jeppe Marimba band and a performance by the Jeppe Dance Squad. The Head Girl and Deputy Head Girls presented Mrs Steyn with a booklet of thanks made up by


