John told the girls of some of the challenges he faces and how he needs a new wheelchair as he has outgrown his current chair. It was decided that our coin collection would go towards buying John, who is in



Grade 11, a new wheelchair.

R17 345 was raised through our coin collection. We had a second intervention on 1st September entitled "John's Friday" where girls were encouraged to sacrifice a food item for a day and donate that value towards John's chair. This raised a further R9 560!

We hope to present John with his new wheelchair soon. Thank you to the girls, their parents and families and the community for their generosity.


