### 2017 MATRIC RESULTS

"Congratulations to all the class of 2017 who maintained the school's 100% pass rate for the 24th year in succession. 180 of our 181 matriculants achieved marks that allow them to progress to tertiary education, with 89% obtaining admission to a bachelor's degree. A total of 153 distinctions were obtained overall and 55 girls obtained an average of over 70%.
